SUBJECT Mills & Associates: Franklin County, Virginia, Extended Survey

BACKGROUND: **William Mills**, born c1784–85 or 1787–88, reportedly in Franklin County; died c1863, apparently in Pulaski County, VA (cut 1839 from Montgomery and Wythe). He married 1815, in Franklin County, Drucilla Kemp, daughter of Robert Kemp and Milly Emundson, daughter of Richard) who wed 1786 in Franklin. Drucilla's stepmother was Sarah Mattox (daughter of Nathan), who married Robert Kemp in 1802. Bondsman for William's marriage to Drucilla was Stephen Standifer.¹

William Mills and Drucilla Kemp were the parents of nine children:

1. **JAMES HARRISON MILLS**, b. c1816; first appeared on Franklin Co. tax rolls, adjacent to William, in 1837. He has not been found after the Franklin roll of 1844.
2. **SAMUEL E(DMUNDSON?) MILLS**, b. 26 February 1818; died 31 July 1894, Talbot Co., GA; married (1) **Mary Ann Hobson**, 17 December 1841, Franklin Co., VA, with James Patterson as bondsman; (2) **Rebecca Amy Collier**, 19 March 1868, Upson Co., GA.
3. **WILLIAM B(RECKENRIDGE?) MILLS**, b. c1820, makes his first appearance in Franklin on the 1841 tax roll. On 19 October 1847, in Franklin Co., he married **Mary M. Matthews**. He died of gunshot wound, 30 April 1865, on his way home from war.
4. **SPARREL MILLS**, b. c1824, Franklin Co.; first appears on the Franklin Co. tax roll of 1845; married **Martha Susan Jarrett**, daughter of Allen Jarrett, 1848, in Henry Co., VA. In 1850, he and his in-laws and parents were all in Floyd Co. In 1852–54 he was taxed in Montgomery Co. The 1860 census of Montgomery cites him as a laborer, living among other laboring families, apparently on the substantial farm of Andrew J. Lucas. Postwar, he remained in Montgomery, and died after 3 May 1900, when he filed an application for a Confederate pension as a resident of Radford.
5. **ROBERT WILEY MILLS**, b. c1826; died 31 May 1862, Battle of Seven Pines near Richmond. He married 18 December 1843, Henry Co., VA, **Mary Jarrett**, daughter of Allen Jarrett. In 1850, as "Wiley Mills," he is enumerated as a farmer in Floyd Co. He enlisted at the Floyd Co. courthouse on 14 March 1862 (age 36) in Co. A, 24th VA Infantry, under Lt. G. M. Helms.
6. **CHARLES T. MILLS**, b. c1828, or 1833, Franklin Co.; married **Sarah E. Fleeman**, daughter of Elias and Patsy Fleeman," 22 December 1857, Montgomery Co., where they were enumerated in 1860. By 1870, they had moved to Claiborne Co., TN, by 1870. Both died after the 1880 census of Claiborne.
7. **SARAH "SALLIE" ANN MILLS**, b. ca. 1830, m. in Floyd Co., c16 December 1850, **William H. Key**, (parents unidentified). The 1850 census of Floyd places William, 23, "born in Giles Co.," in the home of George Key, 36, and wife Hannah Kester, adjacent to Sparrel Mills and his Jarrett in-laws. In 1860, the Keys lived in the Mills-Jarrett family cluster in Pulaski County's Western District. On 6 April 1864, as "Sarah A. Key," age 35, daughter of "William Mills" and "Drucella Mills," she m. a widower from Lovely Mount (now Radford) in Montgomery Co., **George Bradbury** (*var.* Bradberry), son of Mark. Sarah d. 1 July 1889, Summers Co., WV.

8. **MILLY FRANCES MILLS**, b. April 1832 (variously 1830, 1832, 1833) in Franklin Co.; died after the 6 June 1900 census visitation in Montgomery Co. and, apparently, before the April 1904 death of her husband whose obituary cites children but not a wife. On 27 July 1854 (by license of 22 July) in Floyd Co., Milly married **John B. Lawrence**, who had been born in Bedford Co., VA, as son of William and Agnes Lawrence.
9. **THOMAS R[ICHARD?] MILLS**, b. 11 March 1833, according to his death certificate; married *ca.* 27 August 1855, in Montgomery Co., **Sarah S. Nunnally [var. Nunley]**, daughter of Richard and "B" Nunnally. The couple are cited on the 1860 census, Pulaski Co., VA, next door to both sets of parents. In 1880, they resided in Montgomery Co.; but by 1900 they were back in Pulaski Co. where he was employed as a "river ferryman."² Thomas died 5 April 1915 of "chronic Bright's disease."

KEY ISSUES:

William's birth family is unknown; but his Y-line is that of descendants of the Virginia immigrant John Witt/Whitt. **For the purpose of identification in this project—one that involves many William Millses—I am calling him William Mills-Witt.**

- The area that became Franklin County in 1785 was cut from Henry and Bedford Counties. The region north of Blackwater River was cut from Bedford (formerly Lunenburg). The region south of Blackwater River was cut from Henry (formerly Pittsylvania and Halifax).
- Prior to 1785, families surnamed Edmundson, Kemp, Maddox, Mills, and Standifer, lived and interacted in both Henry and Bedford.
- Only one Mills family has been placed in the Franklin County area at the time William was supposedly born there: a family headed by one **James Mills** who lived in the part of Bedford that was cut off to create Franklin. This James Mills had a son William (m. Elizabeth Abshire, 1796, in Franklin) who is now thoroughly disambiguated from William Mills-Witt.
- Henry County also had a contemporary settler named William Mills, husband of Elizabeth Fontaine. They, too, had a son William (William Fontaine Mills) who is now thoroughly disambiguated from William Mills-Witt.³

Witts/Whitts have been found in both Bedford and Henry, offshoots of the same family.⁴ If the change of the Mills surname to the Witt Y occurred with the conception of William, rather than before him, then I should especially watch for a Witt/Whitt male in proximity to a Mills female in the place and time of that conception.⁵

Male-line descendants of two different sons of William and Drucilla all carry the Witt/Whitt Y, with no genetic distance between them on 111-marker tests. The earliest tester for each son's line was Clay Mills (a descendant of Samuel E. Mills, b. 1818) and Edward E. Mills (a descendant of Robert Wiley Mills, b. c1824).

ASSOCIATES: At William Mills-Witt’s first appearance on record in Franklin, 1806, he was entered onto the tax roll between **Booker Mullins** and **Samuel McCarrell** (aka Carrell). He remained between them until 1811, at which time William was dropped but Mullins and McCarrell continued to be taxed in the same position on the list.

The 1810 federal census of Franklin includes Mullins, but not Mills or McCarrell. One Samuel **Carrell** appears on the census of adjacent Montgomery county that year, as does one **Thomas Musgrove**. However, the age data for that Samuel Carrell and his household seems incompatible with known data for Samuel McCarrell.

In 1812, William reappears on the Franklin tax roll, positioned between Thomas **Mullins** and **Thomas Musgrove**. The 1820 census (semi-alphabetized) places him between “**Bowker**” and **Jacob Mullins**, his new in-law Gabriel Mattox, and the Mattox in-law, John **Manning**.

Concurrent Mills research in Montgomery and Giles counties—originally adjacent to Franklin—suggests the possibility of a relationship with two other families that settled near the mountain gaps that linked these counties:

1. NAPIER

This family came to Franklin and Montgomery from Fluvanna (formerly Albemarle). In Fluvanna, they were associates of the Thomas Tilman family, whose daughter Lucy married Jesse Mills of Amherst. One daughter of Lucy and Jesse, Sarah “Sally” Mills, appeared in Montgomery as a single mother in 1791, at which time she married Elijah Sartain of Stony Creek of New River. Elijah’s sister Sarah was married to Humphrey Blankenship, whose sister Mary was wed to Thomas Hughes Napier, formerly of Fluvanna and brother of the Napier males who settled Franklin.

Elijah and Sarah (Mills) Sartain, Humphrey and Sally (Sartain) Blankenship, and the widowed Mary (Blankenship) Napier with her sons all moved together from Montgomery to Gallia County, Ohio, c1815. **Sarah Mills is one of the two likely**

candidates for the mother of the William Mills-Witt, b. 1783–88, who married Drucilla Kemp.⁶

2. TONEY

William Toney, also formerly of Fluvanna (and Albemarle before that), settled north of the Blackwater at the head of Cahas Mountain about the time Franklin was created. His son John Toney settled across the mountain at The Narrows of New River in current Giles where he operated a tavern and mills and owned other land on East River. There, in 1816, “William Mills” witnessed two documents for Toney. A page-by-page reading of all surviving courthouse records for Giles yielded no other trace of a contemporary William Mills in Giles.⁷

Toney was a close associate of one Benjamin White of Albemarle and Giles, whose middle-aged father John White took a new wife in August 1792, Montgomery Co. **That wife, Frances Mills of unknown origin, is the second prospect for William Mills-Witt’s’ mother**, if his birth did occur in 1784. Prior to marriage, in 1786 and 1788, she bore a son and daughter. Descendants of her son Samuel Mills carry the Y-DNA of the Adkins-Mullins family of Montgomery and Franklin.⁸

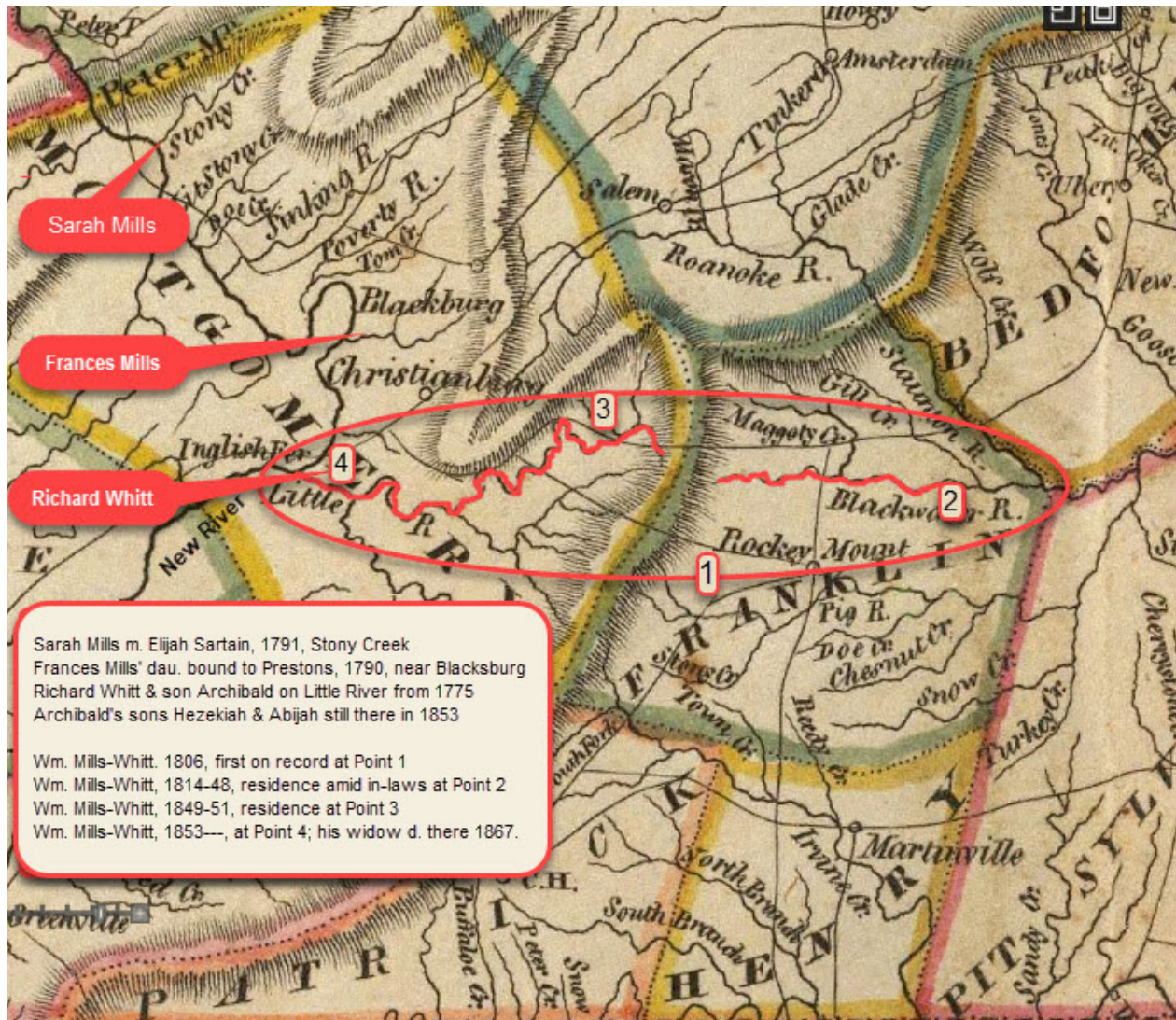

Executive Summary

Disambiguation between Multiple Williams:

This set of notes defines five different William Millses in Franklin County contemporaneously. By order of age or first appearance on record, they are

1. **William Mills “Sr.”** This man, of Maggoty and Elliott Creeks, was the son of the original settler James Mills and was married to Elizabeth Abshire. He died in 1841 leaving a will that named Elizabeth, their three sons Hiram, George, and Burrell (unmarried; later called William A. B. in records that disposed of the parental land) and four daughters: Leona Mills, Betsy Mills, Katharine Rucker, and Patsey Mills (the latter coupled in the will with “James Otey Mills ... my grandson”).
2. **William Mills “Jr.”**, as he is called from 1833 to 1837, married at the time to Mary “Polly” Showalter/Shewalter. Also a resident of the Maggoty and Elliott Creek area, he appears to be the son of one of William Sr.’s brothers—either Arthur Mills or James Mills Jr., whose widow Nancy (née Frame) remained in that region.
3. **William Mills** of the Blackwater, married to Drucilla Kemp.
4. **William A. Burrell Mills**. Son of William Sr. and Elizabeth Abshire, he was still single in 1841 when William Sr. died. In January 1847, he married Mary Abshire, with Anderson Starkey as his bondsman. On 4 October 1847, as “William A. B. Mills,” he, his wife “Mary E.,” and his mother Elizabeth sold William Sr.’s land to Anderson Starkey. William A. B. Mills left Franklin before the 1850 census.
5. **William B. Mills**, born about 1820 to William and Drucilla. In October 1847, he married Mary M. Matthews, with William C. Barber as surety. He and Mary appear on Franklin’s 1850 and 1860 censuses. He died 3 April 1865; and Mary remained in Franklin with their offspring.

Disposition of William and Drucilla’s Franklin County land:

William and Drucilla Mills inherited 151 acres on the Blackwater River from her father Robert Kemp in 1829–30. They remained on the land until 1848, when they moved up the Blackwater, across the county line into Floyd County, and then up New River to central Floyd. However, they did not dispose of the land that Drucilla had inherited from her father. Those 151 acres continued to be taxed to “William Mills (Floyd Co.)” until 1861. Absentee ownership of this type usually occurred when the owner rented out the land or—as apparent in this case—turned over the land to a family member to farm. That family member, in this case, was the only son who remained in Franklin County: William B. Mills.

In 1861 and 1862, the tax entries for Drucilla’s inherited land shifted to “William Mills, *Franklin County.*” Between the tax rolls of 1863 and 1865, three major changes occurred in the ownership or management of this land.

- William Sr. appears to have died in late 1862, after the last recorded death in Pulaski County, but before January 1863. At that time the land clearly passed to the possession of the son William B.
- Between 1863 and 1865, the Mills tract was reduced from 151 acres to 126 acres. No deed documents a transfer of title for the missing 25 acres. No court record has been found by which part of the tract was seized to satisfy a court judgment. However, tax rolls state that a new survey of the land was made in 1863 that reflected the loss of the acreage.
- William B. died in 1865, killed by gunshot on his way home from war.

An explanation for the missing land is found in a furlough request that William B. Mills made on 4 January 1863. As a private assigned by the Confederacy to “daily duty as Overseer,” he asked permission to return home because he had “some transactions to manage with regard to my land which requires my personal attention.” He then added: “unless I can go and attend to that matter it will be very much against the interest of myself and family, [being] a poor man with a wife and seven Children.” The

furlough was granted the next day with the notation “We can spare an overseer at this time better than hereafter.” That request coincides with the death period previously determined for William Mills-Witt.⁹

No tax roll exists for Franklin County in 1864. In 1865, the remaining 126 acres continued to be taxed to “William Mills” until 1895, with alterations as follows:

- 1872–1883. A notation beside the tax entry for “William Mills” states that the tax was to be paid by Wilson Cundiff.
- 1884. The notation was changed to “J. W. Hutt and Rhoda Cundiff pays.” [Rhoda Cundiff was the widow of Wilson; J. W. Hutt(s) appears to have been their son-in-law.
- 1885–86. The Mills tax assessment in 1886 was again reduced by 66 acres. Meanwhile, 1885 transactions in the settlement of the Cundiff estate conveyed two tracts of land—including one tract of 66 acres—to J. W. “Hutts.” The 66-acre tract was said to adjoin “Hutts Mill” (on Standifer Creek) and the east corner of “William’s line” [i.e., William Mills’ line].
- 1890. A commissioner was appointed to sell the interest that Rhoda Cundiff, deceased, held in the estate of her husband. The remaining Mills acreage was purchased by James A. Cundiff at a sale conducted by Commissioner Jno. P. Lee—but continued to be taxed to “William Mills.”
- 1893–94. The case J. W. Cundiff et al. vs. Cundiff et al. charged that Commissioner Lee still had not made the title to James A. Cundiff. That was done in February 1894, at which time the title included “60 acres ... a portion of a tract purchased by the said Wilson Cundiff in his lifetime from William Mills.” At that point, William Mills’s name is dropped from the land tax roll.

The 1894 deed’s recital of events attributed to the “lifetime” of William Mills—events that would have occurred three decades earlier—is clearly flawed. Cundiff did not begin to pay taxes on the land until 1872—nine years after the death of William Mills-Witt and seven years after the death of his son William B. Mills. At that time, the widow of William B. may have made an agreement to sell the land to Cundiff at some future point; but the actual sale clearly occurred in two different stages: first the sale of 66 acres, then the sale of the final 60.

Evidence found to date does not enable us to determine whether Cundiff was involved in the 1863 threat to William B.’s ownership of the land—a threat that resulted in the first loss of 25 acres. Considering that Cundiff’s involvement in the land is not documented until 1872, it is possible that the 1863 issue resulted from the death of William B.’s father and the need to stabilize his possession of the land that he had been occupying without a recorded title.

Napier: Potential Connection

Three Napier heads-of-household appear in Franklin County records about the time that William Mills-Witt was born in Franklin:

- **Robert Napier Sr.**, who entered land before 1788 at the juncture of Blackwater and Poplar Camp Creek, some four to five miles west of Kemp’s Ford (site of Robert Kemp, father-in-law of William Mills-Witt). In 1795 Robert executed a document from Rockingham County, NC—one by which Ashford Napier of Franklin gave to him a mortgage to his enslaved people and household furnishings to secure a debt Ashford owed to Robert. This Robert is said to have died in 1806, the year that William Mills-Witt first appeared on the Franklin Co. tax roll. No probate appears for him in Franklin County. *Rockingham County’s records need to be combed for him and, potentially, a bound child William Mills*

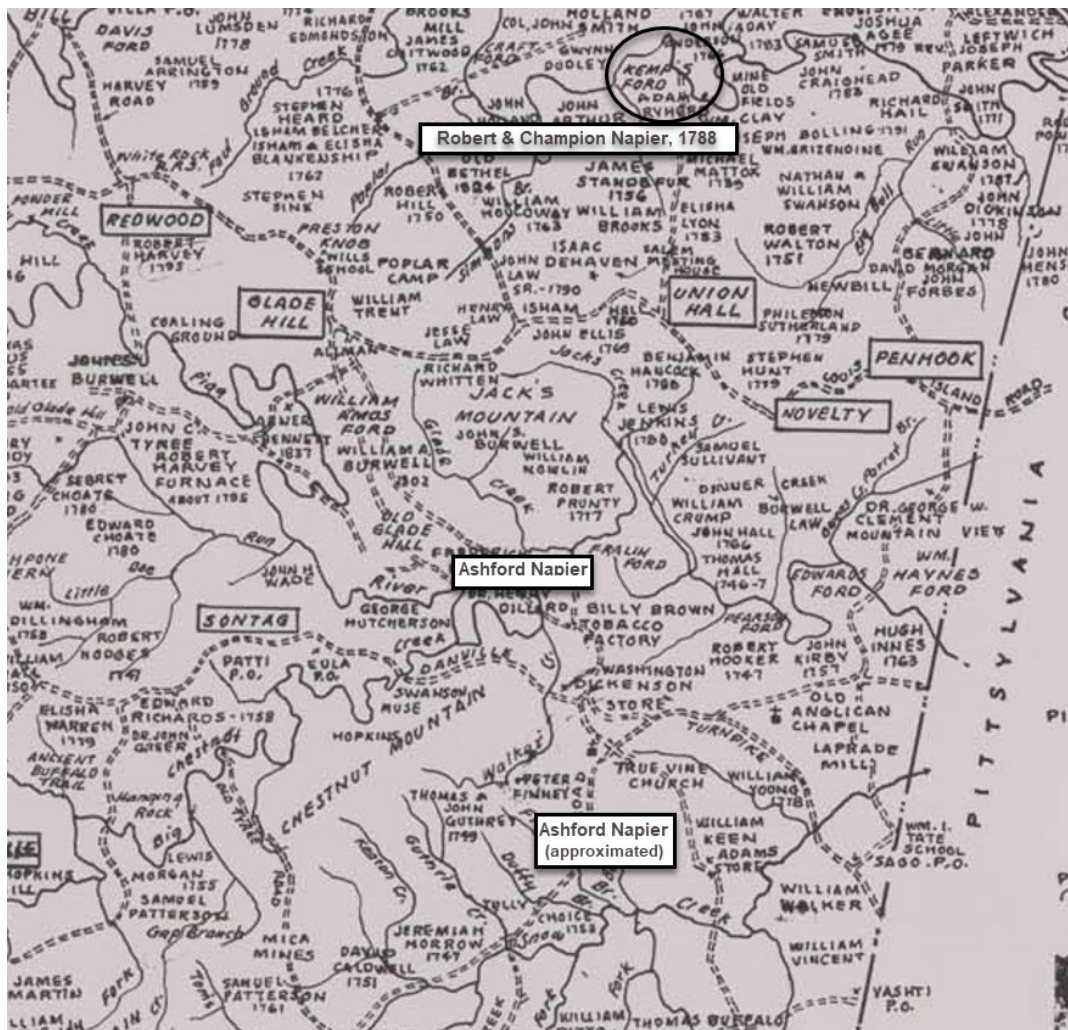
that may have been taken by him to Rockingham when he moved c1790–94.

- **Ashford Napier**, whose deeds place him on Maple Branch of Snow Creek, where he and wife Mary Ann sold land in 1787. (A younger Ashford C. Napier sold land on Panther Creek adjoining Ashford Napier in 1794, without a wife’s participation.) In April 1800, Ashford gave a power-of-attorney to (his putative brothers) **Patrick Napier of Fluvanna** (associate of the Mills-Tilman family of Fluvanna and Amherst), Col. Thomas Napier of Georgia, and Champion Napier of Franklin Co. to conduct business for him—suggesting that Ashford owned property in all three locales.
- **Champion Napier** who sold land in 1790, with wife Gracey. That land, “on branches of Black Water,” joined Richard Edmondson, the grandfather of Drucilla Kemp who married William Mills-Witt in 1815.

Other Associated Families

This report includes newly extracted records on three families whose offspring married children of William Mills-Witt: Fleeman, Jarret, and Key.

Land purchase

Josiah Marcum (x) of Henry County, Virginia to **Robert Napier**, sale for 50£ on **Black water River** adjoining land of "**Sam^l Robert Napier, Peter Hollands, and Humphrey Edmondson**" ... crossing **Camp Creek ... Poplar Camp Creek ... and William Heard's old line.**" [Metes and bounds not copied here.] Witnesses: James Mason, Israel Standifer, John Haynes (x), Humphrey Edmondson.¹¹

COMMENT:

- The Napiers, formerly of Fluvanna County, are being considered as a "conduit" through which the single woman Sarah Mills arrived in Franklin County. Sarah's grandfather Thomas Tilman Sr., and uncles Thomas Jr. and Daniel were Napier associates in Fluvanna.
- By 1791, Sarah Mills relocated to Montgomery County where she married that year into the Sartain-Napier-Blankenship clan. From there, she would move with those three families to Gallia County, Ohio.
- Sarah's proposed premarital son Samuel Mills, b. c1788, remained in Franklin County where he first appeared on the tax roll in 1806 and, in 1815, married the daughter of Robert Camp/Kemp and the granddaughter of Richard Edmondson (see 1 February 1790 below).
- As seen under 1 February 1790, below, Champion Napier's land also lay in this same neighborhood, adjacent to Richard Edmondson.
- Note on the map below the proximity between Robert & Champion Napier and William Mills-Witt's father-in-law, Robert Kemp.

6 AUGUST 1786 FRANKLIN COUNTY, VA

Land purchase

John Gillaspy to **Benjamin White**, both of Franklin County, sale for 50£ Virginia money, receipt acknowledged, 154 acres in Franklin on **N fork of Chesnut Creek**, bounded as follows:

At **Warrins & Richardson** Corner post oak, thence with Warrin's line, S 65° E 168 poles to pointers, thence new lines N 18 E 252p, crossing 3 branches to a red oak, S 75 W 182p crossing a branch to a white oak in Richardson's line, thence with his line S 33 E 52p to a red oak, S 28 W 62p to a red oak, S 67 W 54p to the first station.

Signed: John Gillaspy. Witnesses: none named. Proved October 1786 court by acknowledgment of Jon Gillaspy & Anna his wife.¹²

This Benjamin White has not been identified. His locale on the North Fork of Chesnut Creek lay just below the land of John Ferguson Wade/Waid, nephew of Samuel McCarrell in whose company William Mills-Witt first emerged in 1806. (The Settlement Map of Franklin misrenders Wade's name as "John S." rather than "John F."¹³)

Relinquish her right Dower in and two the sd Land ... in the sd. County of Franklin When you have done it that you Certify to our Justices of our said County Court of Franklin under your hands & Seals Distinctly and Plainly you send together with this Witness Stephen Smith Clerk of sd. County Court at the Courthouse the third Day of September 1787." Elizabeth Keeley relinquished her rights before R^t Maxwell and Ambrose Blackburn, JPs [county not stated in the acknowledgement.

11 March 178_ [illegible digit; the 8 is clear enough, even though the sequence of documents makes it appear to be wrong], Daniel Richardson assigned the bond to Saml. Calland. Witnesses: Obadiah Richardson, Saml. Tompkins Jr.

8 February 1790, **Champion Napier** with Thomas Townso? as surety, signed a bond in favor of Daniel Richardson, guaranteeing his appearance in the New London Court on 15th September next. Witness: Lewis Davis.

9 April 1790 Saml. Callard acknowledged that he had “Recd. of **Champion Napier** one Negro Boy in Part of the within bond.”

COMMENT:

Regarding Robert Napier’s move to Rockingham County, NC:

- As previously noted, when William Mills-Witt first appeared on the 1806 tax roll as a propertyless adult male, he was coupled with the young landowner, Samuel McCarrell.
- McCarrell’s mother was the daughter of the wealthy John Ferguson (d. 1789) whose family clustered between Pigg River and Storey Creek—and (roadwise) between Wade’s Stage Stop and Standefur’s Stage Stop—a bit southwest of the Washington Iron Works.
- John Ferguson’s daughter, Fanny Ferguson (McCarrell’s aunt) was married to, but estranged from, Moses Wade who also left Franklin in the 1790s for Rockingham County, NC.³³ The 1800 census places Robert Napier’s 55 households from Moses Wade on a census that had 1121 families.³⁴

“I reserve to the use of myself and wife one third part of my Estate and one third part to my **son Ashford** and **Fanney Napier**, and the other third to my **Daughters Mary Anne** and **Susannah Napier**, and at the decease of myself or wife, the half of the third part which I have reserved to myself & wife to be given to my Daughter Susannah, and at the death of the other party (to wit) me or my wife, I give the other half of said Property to my Daughter Mary Anne Napier. ...”

Witnesses: Ben Cook, Jno. Cook. Junen court 1801, proved by oath of the subscribing witnesses.⁴³

COMMENT:

The tenor of this document implies that Ashford Napier owns property physically in Fluvanna, Georgia, and North Carolina, as well as Franklin County.

“Hands” assigned to John Showalter ... **Wm. Mills, George Mills.**⁴⁵

COMMENT:

No previously known document has suggested parentage for George. I have proposed him as a son of James and brother of William, based on the fact that no other Mills family resided in the county during the few short years that he was here. The above document now places directly in association with William, in the neighborhood in which James owned land for the last four decades of his life. As a rule, young men were assigned to work the stretch of road on which they lived.

COMMENT:

This is the neighborhood in which William Mills-Witt first appeared on the 1806 tax roll, listed immediately after Samuel McCarroll, his list having been turned in the same day as McCarroll and Booker Mullins. It appears likely that Mills was one of McCarroll’s unidentified “hands” (i.e., employees, non-landowning family members, or enslaved men) who were assigned road duty with him.

“This Indenture of bargain and sale between Maryann Napier, Elisha Keen, Robert Napier, William Napier, David Napier, John Napier, Skelton Brown, Ashford Napier, and John Whitesell, all of the one part, and Sterlin Cooper of the other part was exhibited into the said office and proved as to the said Elisha Keen Robert Napier and Ashford Napier by the oath of Richard Stockton and Adda Garatt, two of the subscribing witnesses hereto—And in the said county court clerk’s office August 6 1838. This said Indenture was further proved by the oath of H. Andrews one other subscribing witness hereto and admitted to record.”⁵⁵

COMMENT:

Ashford Napier, Sr., alleged son of Robert Napier by wife Mary Tarleton Hughes and husband of Mary Ann Staples, is said to have died in Franklin County in 1801.⁵⁶ (I have not yet had time to verify these assertions.)

If correct, then the land of Ashford Napier was adjacent to the residence of **Adda Jarrett and young Allen Jarret, whose daughters subsequently married two sons of William and Drucilla (Kemp) Mills**. At the time of this document, William Mills-Witt would have been an older teen, of unknown residence.

Peter Jr. was also, in that time frame, a justice of the peace in Floyd.

Booker Mullins on the 1806 tax roll appears in this cluster of tithables who submitted list on same day: *Samuel McCarrell, William Mills, Booker Mullins*. The fact that Mullins above had no hands suggests that Mills was, indeed, one of McCarrell's hands.

COMMENT:

- This Samuel McCarroll/McCarrell is the young landowner with whom William Mills is coupled in 1806 when he first came onto Franklin’s tax roll as a propertyless tithable. McCarroll also owned land in Montgomery Co. that was purchased by his grandfather John Ferguson Sr.
- Thomas Robertson was married to Naomi Wade, daughter of Moses Wade and wife Fanny Ferguson (i.e., Samuel McCarrell’s aunt).⁷⁰
- George Menefee was McCarroll’s cousin on the Ferguson side.
- The McCarrell-Menafee/Menefee land lay roughly at Locale 1 on Map 1. From there, the Menafee land extended east toward the center of the county.

COMMENT:

In 1799, the stated requirement for serving as juryman was to be “possessed of visible estate both real & personal of the value of £100 [and] in no wise akin to the said” defendant.⁹³

The “both real & personal” would seem to mean “real and/or personal” given that no landholding can be found for George Mills.

Note: In a subsequent murder trial, in the same court the following year, the financial requirement was \$300.⁹⁴

That upon sufficient testimony it appearing to the Court that **Moses Napier** is entitled to a negro girl named **Massey** and that said Napier is an Inhabitant of Virginia, on Motion it is ordered and certified by the Court aforesaid that the late Governor Alexander Martin by his last will and testament duly made and published bequeathed to **Sarah Martin, now the wife of Moses Napier**, a negro girl by the name of Massey to her, her heirs and assigns forever, that the said negro girl is about the age of fourteen, of a black complexion, and hath been since the decease of the said Alexander Martin until now in this County. That the said Moses Napier by virtue of a lawful marriage with the said Sarah his wife is entitled to the property in the said negro girl. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of my office at Rockingham aforesaid this 31 day of May 1811. Ro. Gallaway, C.C.” Certificate presented to Franklin County court on 1 July 1811 for recording.¹⁰²

James Sr. was at that time a landowner. No land has been found for James Jr., who would die before the 1820 census.

Hale, **Robert Camp**, Wm. Smith, Thos. Dudley, Henry Smith, Thos. Hiatt, Benjamin Barnard, Peter Barnard, John Craghead, George Radford, Benja. Booth, Levi Dudley and Matthew Farmer.¹⁰⁸

COMMENT:

- This Robert Camp/Kemp was father of Drucilla and eventual father-in-law of William Mills-Witt.
- On 14 October 1814, one William Mills signed a similar petition in Montgomery Co. (with Samuel Maddox (a Kemp-Camp in-law), James Light, John Shockey, and others), requesting “a law compelling owners of dams and other obstructions across the Roanoke River to make slopes or otherwise to provide for the passage of fish.”¹⁰⁹ No contemporary William Mills has been found in Montgomery Co. who might be the person involved there in the fishing industry.

Again there is no appendix to the name to indicate which William Mills. There were two of poll age cited in this year’s tax roll: William, husband of Elizabeth Abshire; and the younger William who would marry Drucilla Kemp. However, the younger William did not own land. The older William farmed with his landowning father James.

I’ve also noticed that the use of Sr. or Jr. is extremely rare in the juror lists. It is seen for deeds and court cases, but the distinction is not usually made when identifying jurors.

One alternative way to potentially identify a juror—when unrelated same-name men exist in the county—is to consider whether kinsmen also served on the same jury. Frequently these lists include a group of related men who appear to have come to court together—and often because

It is likely that this is inherited land through the Robertson family.

William Mills serves on jury in case of John Vandover vs. Jno. Highley, together with Booth **Napier**, Thomas **Napier**, **George Furguson** and others.¹¹⁹

COMMENT:

This William should be the William of Maggoty and Elliott Creek (husband of Elizabeth Abshire) rather than the younger and propertyless William who wed Drucilla Kemp in 1815.

Choie & Jesse Prunty relinquished all pretensions to any claim on the sd. Land. Signed by all three parties. Witnesses: Peter C. Stockton, Howard Hix (supposedly a signature), and Dibdale Hix. Proved by oaths of Stockton, Howard Hix, and Thos. C. Hix in court on 6 March 1815.”¹²¹

COMMENT:

Turkey Cock Mountain is SE of Snow Creek, which is SE of Big Chestnut Creek and Pigg River in lower Franklin, above the Henry County line. It is in the area settled by Ashford Napier.

TO DO:

- Townes & Hale, merchants (1819)

Hendrick, and **Jourdan Kemp** (who are hereby appointed commissioners for this purpose) do assign to **Adra Kemp** one third part of the Lands and slaves belonging to the **Estate of William English decd**, and that they do after duly advertising the time and place of Sale sell to the highest Bidder the remaining two thirds of the said Estate Consisting of Lands and Slaves, on a Credit of twelve months requiring Bond and good Security to be given by the purchase and assign the proceeds to the Complainants and Defendants equally, except **William Kemp** and **Adra** his wife – and make Report to the Court, giving to the infant Defendants six months after their respective disabilities shall be removed to shew Cause against this Decree."¹⁴⁵

COMMENT:

Adra (var. Adria) was the widow of William English, remarried to a Kemp uncle of Drucilla.

“At a Court held for Franklin County the 7th day of December 1829, This account of sale of the Estate of William English dec^d was returned and ordered to be recorded.”¹⁴⁷

This William Mills should be the William who married Drucilla Kemp—i.e., now brother-in-law to James Dudley and the Kemps.

COMMENT:

Given that Fergusons and Menafees were kinsmen of Samuel McCarrell in whose presence William Mills-Witt first appeared in 1806 and for several years thereafter, the coupling here might suggest that the William of this record was William Mills-Witt. *However*, note below that, in this same court term, Arthur Mills (son of James and brother of William Sr.) gave a deed of trust to Eli *Ferguson*. Apparently both sets of Millses (William of the Black Water and the James Mills offspring of the Maggoty) associated with the Fergusons. Numerous documents do place George Ferguson north of the Blackwater in the western half of the county.

No witnesses. Wife Ruth relinquished her dower rights before Moses Greer Jr. and Patrick Hix, justices of the peace, 27 January 1821. Deed acknowledged by Early in open court on 16 March 1821.”¹⁵⁸

This William Mills should be the William of Maggoty and Elliott Creeks, son of James and husband of Elizabeth Abshire. His father James was an associate of the Earlys since at least the early 1780s in Bedford. The reference to “Mills’ line” above appears to be a reference to the land James settled and, about this time, turned over to his eldest son William.”

Meanwhile, William Mills-Witt did not pay tax on land in the 1820s and appears to have owned none other than the tract he later inherited from his father-in-law.

- Ransom Sutherland in 1815 submitted his list on the same day as William Mills. In other years, other Sutherlands/Southerlands submitted on the same day. This road order places them within 3 miles or so of Robert Kemp’s land.

The case of Commonwealth vs. "William Dillion son of Arthur" charges him with assaulting Michael Crantz "at William C. Ashworth's school House." (1 August 1828, digital film 8704987, frames 249-252, particularly 251)

In December 1828 a summons was also issued to William C. Ashworth, Patrick Hix, John Bowman, Elijah Poteet, Sally Bond, Mary Hix (wife of Jeremiah Hix) and John Pasley as witnesses in the breach-of-promise suit filed by the "infant" Milly C. Bond against Ambrose Abshire (Ibid., frame 702). William Gunson was the "next friend" who sued on Milly's behalf. Patrick Hix was then the county sheriff. Other witnesses were summoned later, including Jincy Ashworth (image 714). Image 718 has a full list of witnesses, the dates they appeared, and the amounts paid to each—but no mileage..

This William Mills "Jr." should be the Elliott's Creek man noted under 1834 below, a man who married into the Shewalter/Showalter family.

COMMENT:

Gabriel Maddox was a brother of Drucilla’s stepmother, Sarah Maddox (daughter of Nathan).

The presence of “Wesley A. White” in the estate settlement of Thomas Kemp could be of considerable significance to the identity of Thomas’s in-law, William Mills. Consider these points:

- In August 1827, in Giles County, **Wesley White, David Mills**, Benjamin White [first cousin of David Mills], John Conner, Zachariah Crawford and a couple of dozen others were jointly given a title-clearance deed by James and Charlotte Hector covering lands they had purchased “on the N side of Bluestone River, Giles County,” beginning on the S “side of a ridge, near the forks of a branch & near Jas. White’s corner.”²⁰⁴
- David Mills was the son of Samuel Mills of Giles, the premarital son of Frances “Frankey” (Mills) White, one of the two potential mothers for William Mills-Witt.
- The Wesley White of Giles almost certainly was a son of David Mills’s grandmother Frances by John White Sr., whom she married in 1792, Montgomery County. Wesley should not be confused with his same-aged half-uncle Benjamin Wesley White, son of Benjamin White and grandson of John White Sr.

- John Conner and Zachariah Crawford were the two men whose 1816 and 1817 Giles Co. leases of land from John Toney were witnessed by **William Mills**. Exhaustive research on Frances and Samuel Mills and their White kin in the resources of Montgomery and Giles Counties reveals no other William Mills connection.
- This “Wesley A. White” does not appear on the Franklin County tax rolls of 1827–35, not even in this year 1833 (and on through 1835) when all male tithables are named whether they had taxable property or not. He does not appear to have been a resident of Franklin. That point raises a question: *Why was he (like William Mills) indebted to William’s in-law?*

TO DO:

Pursue this Wesley White to determine whether he is or is not the Giles County man.

On consideration whereof the court doth confirm said report and doth further adjudge order & decree that the said John Wade shall after first paying the costs of this suit and the expenses of sale, divide the residue of said money into eight equal parts and retain one eighth part thereof in his own right, one other eighth part as the purchaser of **Watkins Hobson**, one other eighth part as the purchaser of **Richard Hobson**, one other eighth part as the purchaser of **John Terry & Henrietta** his wife, one other eighth part as the purchaser of **William Hobson** and **Benjamin Hobson**, only heirs of **Benjamin Hobson decd.**, one other eighth part as the purchaser of **William Hobson** and **Benjamin Hobson** of the reversion of **Sarah Sweeney’s** interest under the will of **Matthew Hobson decd.** upon condition that the said John Wade pays to the said Sarah Sweeney annually the legal interest on that amount, till her death, and also four sevenths of one eighth part thereof as the purchaser of **James Wall, Charles Wall, Matthew Wall & Elizabeth Brandon** late Elizabeth Wall, being their interest under **Sarah Wall** in said estate and that the said John Wade pay over three sevenths of one eighth part thereof to the three infant children of **Sarah Whitfield**, formerly **Sarah Wall**, and the other eighth part thereof to **Timothy Stamps** on application.”²⁰⁵

Stephen King, decd. Buyers included **Booker Mullins** and Joseph Mullins. Also “Perigin **Mills** [Wills?] \$4.44.” Other purchases were Luke Standley, William Clay, “Samuel Smith of Town Creek.” Items not identified.²⁰⁷

COMMENT:

The name Mills is clearly written as such in this document. An earlier document in this book also dealt with “Perigine Wills.” The name at that point was very clearly written with a “W”, with the open space at the top and sharp points on the bottom, while surrounding words beginning with “M” were written with very rounded tops on the “M” and open bottoms.

William Mills Jr. of the County of Franklin to Daniel Ferguson of same. “Whereas the said Wm Mills Jr. is indebted to Sally Shewalter” for \$127.10, with lawful interest from this date, Mills gives a deed of trust, to be held by Ferguson, who has paid \$1, for “half of one tract of land containing 74 acres” in Franklin County adjoining Jacob Peters, Abram **Teel**, “being the same bought of Jacob Peters by Sally & Polley Shewalter,” also 5 head of cattle, 4 head of hogs, 4 beds & bedsteads and furniture, 1 Bureau, 1 chest, 1 flax wheel, 1 cotton wheel, 1 candle stand, 6 chairs, 1 coffee mill, 1 looking glass, 1 table, 1 pot, 1 dutch oven, 1 skillet, 1 frying pan, a parcel of Crockery & earthen ware, 1 side saddle, 2 bar Shir plows. On condition that William Mills pay the due sum on or before 25 December 1837. Signed: William his x mark Mills Jr., Daniel Ferguson, Sally Shewalter.²¹⁰

COMMENT:

This William Mills should be the William of 3 February 1836, below, who (as “Sally Showalter & William Mills and his wife Polly”) deeded 74 acres on “Elects” [Elliott’s] Creek to Daniel Nafe and then dropped from the county tax rolls.

He appears to be the William Mills who was intermittently taxed thereafter in Floyd with Larken and Anderson Mills who also lived intermittently in both counties. He was not a landowner in his

Also two horses, one a bright the othe[r] a dark bay, 7 head of cattle marked with a swaller fork in each ear, 1 house of tobacco, 5 stalks of oats, 3 blade stacks, 3 top stacks, the crop of corn which is now on the plantation, 3 beds, bedsteads, and furniture, 6 chairs, 1 pot, 1 oven, 1 skillet, 6 plates, 2 dishes, 1 set knives & forks?, 1 Cotton wheel, 1 flax wheel, 1 table, ____ of flax, 1 fire shovel, 2 water vessels, 1 powdering? tub, 1 set shewmakers tools, set of cups and saucers, 4 poles axes, 3 ____ hoes, 2 ploughs, plough gear, one mattock, one dozen Turkeys, 4 hens, 2 soller?, 1 churn, 2 augurs, 1 hand saw, 1 drawing knife. Signed William his X mark Mills; Siller her x mark Mills.²¹²

COMMENT:

Much of this document is faded to the point that a complete transcription is unfeasible.

The following comparison of items mortgaged in this deed of trust with those in the mortgage executed in May 1834 by “William Mills Jr.” without a wife’s participation, includes both significant similarities and significant differences.

Both sellers made their marks. No witnesses are named. J.P.s Patrick Hix and Joab Early certify that Mills appeared before them on 26 January 1835 and acknowledged the same as his act and deed. They also certify that Betsey Mills, wife of William, appeared before them and relinquished her dower rights the same day.²¹³

Edward Gray has agreed ... to secure and save the said Robert Wiley harmless [within] twelve months ... to pay the money aforesaid, so advanced.” Therefore Edward Gray gives a deed of trust on 1 gray mare, 1 cow and calf, 1 rifle Gun, 2 beds and furniture, all the ___ of his household furniture, 1 man’s saddle, 10 barrels of corn, and a parcel of oats and fodder. Edward Gray signed.²¹⁴

COMMENT:

William and Drucilla Kemp gave the name “Robert Wiley” to the son they produced in 1826. No evidence suggests a reason for their choice of that name. One Robert Wiley, prior to Floyd County’s creation, was a merchant (c1810) in Botetourt County. William and Drucilla in the late 1840s, would move to Floyd County.

On 21 March 1835 (p. 279), Cary Gray executed a mortgage for his land, placing it on Daniel’s Run. **Daniel’s Run** was the waterway at the mountain gap between Franklin and Floyd, extending into Floyd as a branch of Little River. See my Floyd Co. notes.²¹⁵

However, the 17 August 1837 bail bond, below, suggests that the William Mills who was a Gray associate was William Sr. of the Maggoty and Elliott’s Creek, husband of Elizabeth Abshire.

COMMENT:

There were multiple John Smith's in Franklin—including a prominent John A. Smith who always used the middle initial.

On 20 February 1842, "Peggy Smith d/o John," married Samuel D. Light, a young constable from Floyd County. The 1850 census taker found William and Drucilla Mills living next door to Samuel and Peggy Light, possibly working land that Light bought in 1847.²¹⁸

If this John Smith is the one whose daughter married Constable Light, then his purchase of a homestead from James Toney would provide a tenuous link to William Mills who in 1816 witnessed land leases for James' brother John Toney in Giles County.

Signed: Sally her X mark Showalter; William Mls [sic], Poly [sic] Mills.

5 March 1836, J.P.s Benj. Booth and Ste. Wood certify that Polly came before them to relinquish her dower. They submitted the document for recording on 9 March 1836.²¹⁹

6 MAY 1836

Richard Nunley (s) to John Wright, both of Franklin County. Whereas Nunley is indebted to Pendleton Wright for \$250, he secures the debt with a deed of trust to the following property: 2 Horses, one cart, **One Bed**, Bedstead & furniture, 2 Cows & Calves, 6 Chairs, one pot, one oven, one skillet, one cupboard and contents, plantation utensils of every description, his "present crop of Tobacco, Corn, Wheat, Rye, and Oats, also my crop of 1836, now growing, one Sow & pigs, and one pair of flat Irons." If the debt is paid before 7 August 1837, then this deed becomes null and void.²²⁰

Debt to be paid before 6 August 1837; if not, then this deed goes into effect.²²¹

Also another tract on **Little Creek** containing 176 acres which was given to James by the Commonwealth of Virginia, along with slaves Hannah, Catherine, Ju___, Kitrey?, Andrew, Samuel, Charlotte, May and Jackson, three yead of Hooves stock of cattle, hogs and sheep, Household and Kitchen furniture and utensils and plantation tools including plow and waggon gear and harness, saddle and bridle, with the future increase of the said slaves and personal property, together with all other estate of any kind. All parties signed. Witnesses: J. G. Carper, Ro. T. Woods.²²³

COMMENT:

This type of conveyance was typically one from a father to the children who agreed to care for him in his declining years.

The bond was filed in two interrelated lawsuits heard in several 1840–43 terms of Court:

- John Craghead vs. Polly Craghead
- Leroy B. Law, assignee vs. Polly Craghead

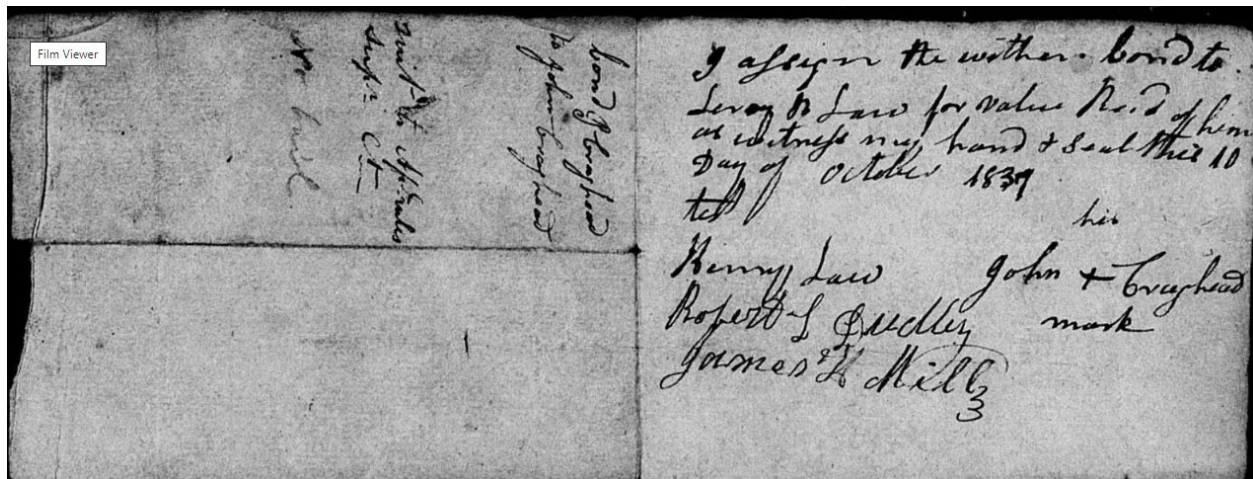
This is the only sample I have to-date of the signature of James H. Mills (aka James Harrison Mills) who came onto the county tax rolls in this year 1837 and dropped out after 1844.

COMMENT:

This is the first reference I’ve found in the county to an adult named Sparrel, other than Sparrel Hale whose grandmother was a Sparrel. This Sparrel Janney was of legal age, placing his birth before 1 January 1817—about the time that Sparrel Hale was coming of age. Subsequently, there grew to adulthood in Franklin many young men named Sparrel.

Holland and Solomon Pasley, Justices of the Peace of Franklin, to relinquish her dower rights and Thomas acknowledged the deed. Certificate of JPs presented in court 7 May 1838.²³⁰

COMMENT:

Note the coupling of "J. Mills & J. Cundiff." The order of the names suggests that Cundiff signed this bond for J. Mills [J. H. Mills, aka James H., aka Harrison], to secure a debt owed by Mills.

James Harrison Mills disappeared from Franklin's records (by death or removal) after the tax list of 1844, apparently with this bond still unpaid. In his absence, Cundiff would have been liable. This may well be the foundation of the curious Mills/Cundiff actions of the 1860s–1890s below, whereby William B. Mills in 1863 was threatened with losing part of the family land—and did lose 25 acres of it before 1865—after which Wilson Cundiff took over paying tax on the land until his death in 1881, after which his widow and son took over the Mills land in two parts between 1885 and 1895.

29 AUGUST 1839

John **Nunley** (X Nunnely) appeared before G. H. Powell, deputy for Samuel Saunders, Sheriff, agreeing to be the special bail for **Richard Nunley** in a debt suit filed against him by Thomas S. Jones & Co. \$74.50 due from January 1837. Warrant had been issued on 30 July 1839. Nunley had signed a bond for the amount due on 24 August 1837, with **Zachfield Wade Jr.** as witness.²³³

COMMENT:

Richard Nunnely's daughter Sarah S., on 27 August 1855 in Montgomery County, married William and Drucilla Mills's youngest son Thomas R. Mills.²³⁴ Records found to date for Richard suggest that he was primarily employed as an overseer. The Franklin County determined papers frequently couple him, John, and Washington Nunnely with the Wade family into which William

Apparently, in 9 December 1839, Richard settled the suit with another promissory note which came due in 1841; thus a continuation of this suit appears amid 1841 cases. See 9 December 1839 below.

John Nunley and Washington Nunley appear to have found wives (before 1852) in the Wright family north of the Blackwater: Omev and Rhoda, respectively. See the suit brought by Skelton Wright, Rite Wright, Asa Wright, John Nunley and Omev his wife, Washington Nunley and Rhoda his wife, Elizabeth Wright, Nelson Abshire and Polly his wife, Matthew Wright, John Wright, Pendleton Wright and Nancy his wife, William Wright, James Wright, Lewis Wright, and Otey **Wright vs. John A. Smith** et al. (including William Turnbull and Thomas C. Callaway), being a suit for debt that exceeded \$8,000. Warrants were issued in 1851 and 1852 by **E. B. Wade**, who the 1860 census places in the "Southwest District" of Franklin County. In an earlier case, Zackfield Wade [Jr.] served as special bail for Richard Nunelly, while his brother John H. Wade is now special bail for Washington Nunelee.

Also convey “one Negroe man named Martin, one old Negroe Woman named Smithy, one Negroe boy named Joshua, one Negroe woman named Sarah and two children named Jack and Martin, one Negroe Woman named Mary and her two children named Lusey and Jim, also all money and bonds in the hands of the Administrators or may come into their hands from the Estate of John Wright. Acknowledged by the husbands, with wives’ relinquishment on 19 February 1841 before Samuel Helm and Moses Greer, Justices of the Peace.²⁴³

“Commonwealth vs. **Saml. Mills**, a jury sworn to try the issue joined to wit: Saml. Patterson, Benjn. T. Bird, **Hiram Mills**, John Crum, Luke Bird, Stephen Martin, Wm. Poteet, Henry Thurmon, Daniel Shiveley, Booker Law, James Martin & Elijah Campbell and returned a verdict of not guilty and judgment accordingly and rule agt. **Wm. A. Burwell** a witness for the commonwealth discharged.”²⁴⁴

COMMENT:

The fact that Hiram Mills served on the jury trying Samuel Mills cannot be taken to mean that the two were not related. Had they been brothers or father and son, Hiram would not serve; but these court minutes are full of cases in which we see more-distant kinships between jurors and parties to the suits they decided.

Hiram Mills is the older brother of William A. Burrel Mills, who bore the same name as the man who charged Samuel Mills with the unidentified offense that brought him into court.

Secondly I will and bequeath to my beloved **wife Elizabeth Mills** the whole of my Estate during her life consisting of my land that I live on, also two head of Horses, Seven head of Cattle, Sixteen head of Hogs, Eight head of Sheep, together with all my Household and Kitchen furniture, Plantation Utensils &c. If my **Daughter Patsey** lives with her mother until she marries, her mother is [to] furnish her with a Bed and Bed furniture left at the discession of her mother. Now it is my request that my son **Burrel W. Mills** at the death of his mother shall have the Land I live on containing 127 acres be the same more or less it is also my request at the death of my wife that my Estate that will be at my wife’s death, Land excepted, shall be sold and equally divided between my six Children namely **Hiram Mills, George Mills, Leona Mills, Betsy Mills, Katharine Rucker, Patsey Mills** also **James Otey Mills** is my **grandson** if he lives with my wife until he is of age, he is to have an equal part with the above named six children. I leave my Shot Gun for the benefit of the Plantation. Now **if my son Burrel should marry or leave his mother** it shall be left in the hands of my Executors to rent or lease the land for the benefit of my wife during her life. Also I desire that my present Crop of all kind shall be left to my wife and family that lives with her, for their support, and pay my just debts. Last of all I constitute and appoint my wife **Elizabeth Mills & Hiram Mills** as sole Executors to my last Will and Testament. As witness my hand and seal this 13th day of September in the year of our Lord 1841.

Clearly the “William Mills Jr.” of 1834 was not the unmarried “Burrell William,” aka William A. B.

“John Jesse is appointed Surveyor of the road from **Col. Hairston’s old store** to the forks of the **Dug Spur & Daniel’s Run Road** in place of James Shepherd with the list of hands filed.”²⁴⁹

COMMENT:

Nancy Dudley was née Kemp, a sister of Drucilla.

And on the motion of **Hiram Mills**, the executor therein named, who made oath & gave bond & security according to law, certificate is granted him for obtaining a probat [sic] thereon in due form. **Elizabeth Mills**, the Executrix named in said will, appearing in court & refusing to qualify as such. Ordered that **Stephen Keslar**, **Anderson Starkey**, and **Henry Stover**, after being sworn for the purpose, do appraise in current money the personal estate of Wm. Mills decd. and return the appraisalment to Court.” ...

“Hannah Webb agt. Fisher & Anderson. A Jury sworn to enquire of damages, to wit: **Hiram Mills**, Harvey Hiatt, Geo. W. Crump, Jno. W. Poindexter, Joseph Horsley, William Waid, John Potter, Abram Childress, Fleming Forbes, Wm. B. Beach, Austin Starkey & Hay Turnbull, and assessed the plaintiffs damages to \$48.00 with interest from the 27th day of December 1839, & judgment accordingly.”

“Commonwealth agt. Abram Crum—a Jury sworn to wit: **Hiram Mills** [etc. as above] & returned a verdict of not guilty & judgment accordingly.”²⁵⁰

“Dudley & al agt. Dudley & al. In Chancery. **Thomas Dudley** is appointed guardian ad litem to the infant defendants **Julia & James A. Dudley** to defend their rights in this suit. And now this cause came on this day to be heard by consent, on the bill, the answers of the defendants, the exhibits & examination of witnesses and was argued by counsel, on consideration whereof the Court doth adjudge, order and decree that John S. Burwell, John M. Holland and Joseph Rives be appointed Commissioners for that purpose (any two of whom may act) do go upon the lands of which **James Dudley** died seized, and allot one third thereof to **Nancy Dudley** his widow, for her dower, having regard to quantity as well as quality, and that they also allot her one third of the negroes—that the same Commissioners or any two of them, after advertising the time and place of sale, sell at public auction at the late residence of James Dudley decd. the remainder of the lands & negroes aforesaid, the lands on a credit of one & two years and the slaves on a credit of twelve months, taking bond and approved security of the purchasers, and that they report their proceedings to the court in order to a final decree.”²⁵¹

6 DECEMBER 1841
FRANKLIN COUNTY, VA

“Ordered that **Henry L. Muse, Pleasant Dickenson, John S. Brown, William Hutcherson & Henry Frailin** or any three of them be appointed Commissioners to divide and assign to the legal heirs of **Benjamin Hobson** decd. the **dower slaves** of **Mary Ann Hobson** late widow of said **Benjamin Hobson**, if the same can be divided in kind & if not, that they then appraise the said dower slaves and make report to court.”²⁵²

COMMENT:

The use of this record to determine the parentage of Samuel E. Mills’s wife is being developed in a separate proof argument.²⁵³

Henry L. Muse made his will 17 February 1845 (proved 9 May 1845), naming wife Elizabeth (executrix) and daughters “Elizabeth Muse” (with reference to “her husband,” unnamed, and a “legacy willed her by her grandfather”) and “Julia Muse” (with reference to “her husband,” unnamed, and a “legacy willed her by her grandfather”). “On the marriage of my said daughter (unnamed) her mother shall give her household property, as much as we gave our daughter

Elizabeth. ... In case either of my daughters depart this life without any child surviving her, the estate given to her shall go to her surviving sister for life. In case Julia makes no will she being unmarried & to her children at her death or to her children immediately if the mother be not living.” Witnesses: Norbone M. Taliaferro, Richd. M. Taliaferro, Pleasant Dickinson.²⁵⁴

7 FEBRUARY 1842
FRANKLIN COUNTY, VA

“On the motion of Joseph Hiett, it is ordered that Jacob Fishburn, Thomas Frith, Charles R. Mason and **William Menafee** or any three of them, do view a way for a proposed alteration of the road from the ford of the creek at **George Menefee’s** plantation on **Chesnut Creek** to the top of the ridge at Joseph Hiett’s plantation and report to Court the conveniences & inconveniences resulting therefrom as well to the public as to individuals.”²⁵⁵

COMMENT:

Chestnut Creek was a branch of Pigg River, southwest of Rocky Mount.

8 FEBRUARY 1842

Pendleton Wright v. **Richard Nunalle**, debt. Summons issued on 8 February to Richard Nunalle to appear on the first Monday of March, next, to answer Wright’s plea of trespass in the case in assumpsit, damages of \$150.

15 February 1844, summons issued to **John Wade** and Nelson Abshire to testify on behalf of Pendleton Wright. Stephen Turnbull returned the summons in May 1844 saying he had executed on Abshire, but “Waid no inhabiter of my County.” Continued to May 1844.²⁵⁶

Estate settlement

“Andrew S. Brooks Administrator of William Robbins deceased in account Current with the Estate of the said William Robbins Deceased ... 7 August 1837 Amount paid **James Patterson** former shff, as pr List of sundry Tax Accounts \$22.49.” The account’s last entry is dated 5 March 1842 and the account was filed for recording that day in county court.²⁵⁷

COMMENT:

On 17 December 1841, when William Mills-Witt’s second-born son Samuel E. Mills took out a bond to marry the younger Mary Ann Hobson, James Patterson was his bondsman.²⁵⁸

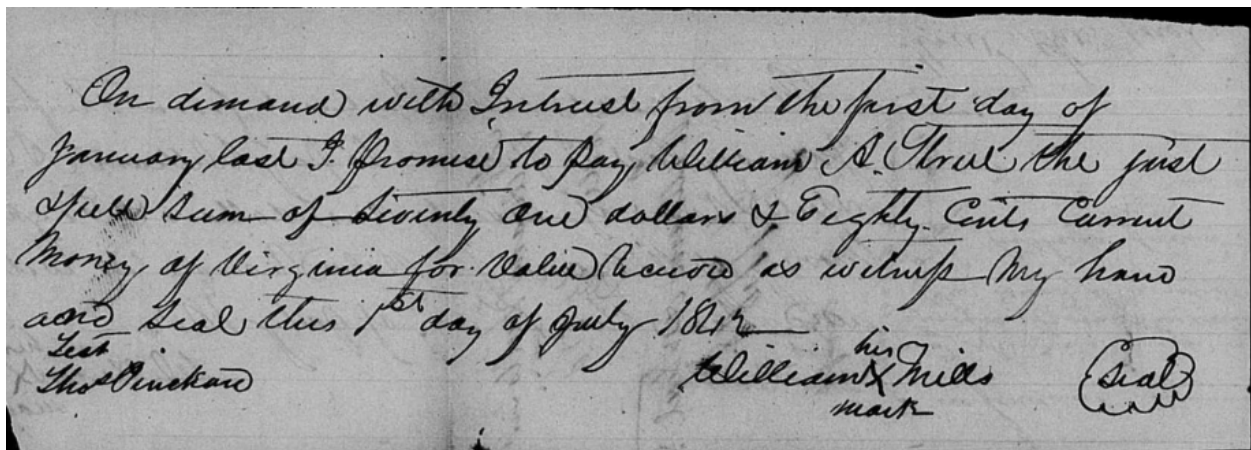
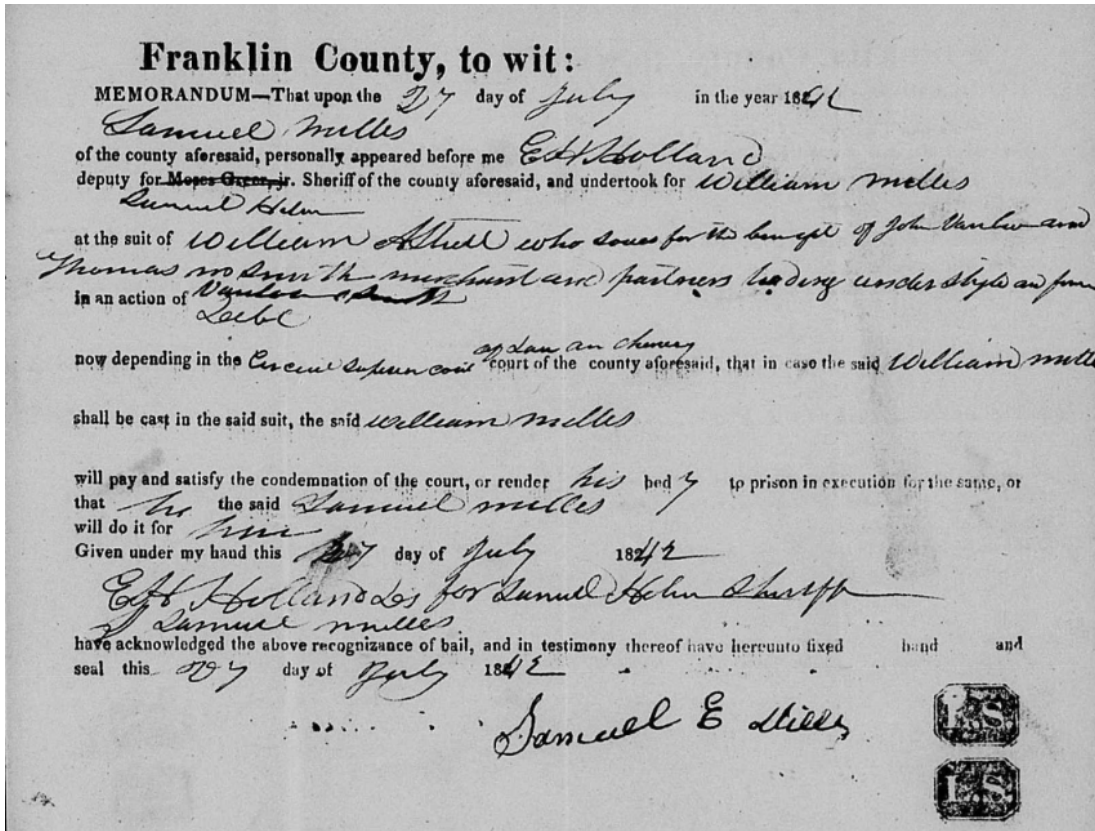

William A. Street vs. "William Mills Sen'." Debt of \$71.68 with interest from 1 January 1842 due to John Van Lew and Thomas M. Smith, merchants and partners trading under style and firm of Vanlew & Smith. Damages: \$50. Summons issued to William Milles 5 July 1842. On 7 July Samuel Milles (signed Samuel E. Mills) went before E. H. Holland, deputy for Samuel Helm, sheriff, to undertake for William. William's note, dated 1 July 1842, and "signed" with his X, was witnessed by Thos. Pinckard.²⁵⁹

COMMENT:

This is the only known signature, to date, for Samuel E. Mills.

“Ordered that **Henry L. Muse, Wm. A. Street, Pleasant Dickinson, and William Hutcherson** or any three of them after being sworn for the purpose, do state and settle the account current of **Samuel Patterson**, Exor. of Saml. Patterson decd. and make report to court.”²⁶⁰

COMMENT:

Muse, Dickinson, and Hutcherson, in December 1841, were appointed to lay off the dower slaves of Mary Ann Hobson, widow of Benjamin Hobson. Eleven days later, another Mary Ann Hobson married Samuel Mills, with James Patterson as bondsman.

William Kemp was brother-in-law of the late James Dudley.

Therefore it is considered that the plaintiff recover against the Defendant Two hundred and fifty dollars with legal interest thereon from the 21st day of October 1842 till payment [of] the debt and interest aforesaid, and his costs by him about his suit in this behalf expended.”²⁶²

COMMENT:

In August 1855, in Montgomery Co., Nunley’s daughter Sarah married William and Drucilla’s son Thomas.²⁶³

Nunnally at Nunally's house, on evidence of John Nunnally. Summons to Fowler returned "not found." October 1843, Nunally was ordered to show cause before the first day of next term as to why he should not be required to give surety for costs in the case. Summons issued 16 July to sheriff of Roanoke County, who executed it. 23 August 1845 Jacob Fowler served as special bail for Richard C. D. Fowler, both of Roanoke.²⁶⁴

COMMENT:

Subsequent proceedings in this case identify Wade as John Wade. He was the father-in-law of James Patterson who served as bondsman for Samuel E. Mills to marry Mary Ann Hobson in December 1841. Those proceedings also imply that John Wade was married to one of the heirs to a larger Hobson estate that was being simultaneously settled.

No subsequent papers; the 1842 papers were filed in Fall 1848.²⁶⁷

Wade & Abshire, Commrs. vs. Asa Holland & S. H. Holland alias Smithson H. Holland. Suit before the court from June 1840 through October 1844, with judgment for Defendants. On 15 October 1842, in response to a judgment in the Superior Court of Bedford on Samul McConolay? & John J. Robertson, for \$100, judgment in the name of Holland & Booth, H&B signed over the note to **John H. Wade**, with John Arthur as witness. On 26 November 1842, **John H. Wade** assigned it to Nelson Absher, with **Isaac Wade** and **Richard Nunnely** as witnesses. Etc.²⁶⁸

COMMENT:

Wade & Nelson Abshire, commissioners, also sued Asa Wright and George F. Wright in a separate case running concurrently and filmed consecutively with this one for more than a hundred images. Image 323 is his petition against **Hiram Mills** and Abram Teel, administrators with the will annexed of George Wright, decd.

Following the Wright suit, is yet another by Luke Wade & Co. against Clarissa Boon for debt, with summons issued to her on 20 May 1844 (begin image 346).

Following the brief Boon issue, there begins a new installment of the Wright vs. Wright case, with Hiram Mills as *adm. de bonis non* with Teel for George Wright's estate (image 350 etc.)

Following that is filmed the case of John E. Waid vs. Otey Kinsey, new husband of Rhoda Wright. This series of Wade–Wright documents running from 1842 through 1844 ends at image 374.

“Commonwealth agt. Robert Williams—[Pleads] Not guilty & issue, and a jury sworn to try the same—to wit Isaac Janney, David Willis, Saml. Hoy, Benja. Bird., **Saml. E. Mills**, Booker Law, Stephen English, Thomas W. Murrill, William Dudley, Isaac D. Brooks, Jno. O. W. Haynes & William Campbell [has] returned a verdict of guilty and assess his fine to one cent, & judgment accordingly & costs.”²⁷⁴

The Loudoun County Harrison’s occupation is consistent with that of William & Drucilla’s sons; however, the location is not. The 1860, 1870, and 1880 censuses show that he remained in Loudoun. *FindAGrave* offers a tombstone of appropriate vintage with a birthdate of 8 December 1819 (at least three years too young).²⁸⁸ This Harrison Mills married Frances R. Muse, 27 January 1844, in Loudoun.²⁸⁹

We command you that from all further proceedings on a Judgement of the County Court of Franklin rendered on the 6th day of March 1844, in an action of debt between Thomas Law plaintiff, and **Samuel Mills** defendant, whereby it was considered that the plaintiff recover against the defendant the sum of [\$45] with interest thereon from the 19th day of May 1842, till paid, and \$10.27 cents costs, **you altogether supersede**; which Judgment before our Circuit Superior Court of Law and Chancery for the said County of Franklin, for cause of error in the same to be corrected, on the petition of the said **Samuel Mills**, we have caused to come, he the said **Samuel Mills** having given security to prosecute with effect, and if the judgment aforesaid shall be affirmed, to pay the same, and all such damages and costs as shall be awarded. We also command you that you give notice to the said Thomas Law, that he be before the Judge of our said Circuit Superior Court at the Courthouse, on the first day of the next Term, then and there to have a rehearing of the whole matter in the judgment aforesaid contained. And have then there this writ. Witness Caleb Tate clerk of our said Circuit Superior Court the 18th day of March 1844 in the 68th year of the Commonwealth.”

19 May 1844, Samuel E. Mills posted bond for \$100, with **Edmund Irvine** as surety.

COMMENT:

“Edmond Irven” appears on the 1850 census of Franklin County as an attorney.

[No date]: “To the Honourable judge of the circuit superior court of Law and chancery for the county of Franklin. The petition of **Samuel E. Mills** respectfully represents that he is aggrieved by the final judgment of the county court of Franklin, rendered on the 6 day of March 1844 in an action of debt, wherein Thomas Law was plaintiff and **William Mills** and the said **Samuel Mills** defendants. A transcript of the record of the judgment complained of is herewith presented, by which it will be perceived that the case is as follows:

- Thomas Law brought an action of debt in the county court of Franklin upon a bond, purporting on its face to have been executed by one **William Mills** and your petitioner. To this action, your petitioner at the June term of said court [no year given], and by leave of said court, filed the plea of *non est factum* [“it is not a fact”—i.e., it is not his deed] to which there was a general implication and issue was joined thereon.
- At the March term of said court, 1844, this cause came on to be tried and thereupon your petitioner by no counsel filed a demurrer to the evidence, adduced by said plaintiff in support of his action aforesaid, to which demurrer there was a joinder on the part of the said plaintiff, and a judgment of said court in favour of said plaintiff, all of which will more fully and at large appear by the annexed transcript of the record of said action.

Your petitioner assigns the following error in said judgment. **1st** Because the supposed writing obligatory having been executed in the absence of **Samuel E. Mills** (your petitioner) and by a third person merely authorised by parol [orally] and not by power of attorney given under the hand and seal of said **Samuel**

E. Mills, and a delivery by him, or any one else in his presence, and at his request having been expressly negated? by the testimony, his subsequent bare acknowledgment that he considered himself bound by the cause did not make the said supposed writing obligatory his act and deed; and the judgment of the court ought to have been that the matter shown in evidence was not sufficient in point of law, to maintain the issue joined on the part of the said plaintiff. And for the said error, he prays *a eu persedias* [?] to the judgment aforesaid. [Signed] **Samuel E. Mills** by Edwd. Irvine his counsel.

"I Edmund Irvine an attorney, practicing in the circuit superior court of law and chancery for the county of Franklin, do certify that in my opinion there is sufficient matter for reversing the judgment complained of in the foregoing petition. [Signed] Edwd. Irvine."

[no date] Thomas Law, by his attorney William B. Crump, rejoined and included transcripts of several documents. Among them was the summons issued 3 January 1843 "to take William Mills and Samuel Mills if they be found within your bailiwick." That summons was endorsed by Deputy Sheriff E. H. Holland as follows: "Executed on **Samuel Mills & William Mills Jr.**, special Bail." **William Mills no inhabitant of my bailiwick.**"

COMMENT:

William B. Mills does not appear on the Franklin County tax roll in that year 1843. William Sr. and Samuel do appear, as does James H. Mills (William and Drucilla's oldest son). No William Mills was taxed in Floyd Co. in 1843. In 1844, both William Millses were taxed in Franklin.

The rejoinder also asserts

- that "the Defendant **Samuel Mills** being arrested and not appearing [in court], on the motion of the plaintiff by his attorney, it is ordered that judgment be entered against [him] and ... that this suit abate against the Defendant **William Mills**.
- "And at another day, to wit: At Rules held in the Clerks Office of the said Court in the month of April 1843, the Defendant **Samuel Mills** still failing to appear it was ordered that the last rule made against him in this suit be confirmed.
- "And at another day, to wit: At a Court of Quarter Sessions held for the said County at the Courthouse on the 6th day of June 1843 came the parties by their attorneys, and on the motion of the Defendant, the judgment entered in the Office in this suit was set aside, and leave given him to plead, and thereupon by his attorney he filed a special plea" saying essentially the same thing that was asserted in his appeal.
- On 5 June 1843 before M. G. Booth, J.P., Samuel E. Mills made oath that the plea was true.
- 6 March 1844 at a jury trial, after hearing the evidence, juror John Bowman withdrew, the other jurors were dismissed, and "the Defendant by his attorney filed a demurrer to the evidence ... And also showed in evidence by **John Patterson** a witness that Samuel Mills was not present at the time said supposed writing obligatory was executed, but that the same was executed by the said John Patterson [variously written as John P. Patterson], a third person, by parol authority from said Mills, and delivered by the said Patterson to the said Plaintiff [**Samuel E. Mills**]. The said Patterson further stated that the said Mills acknowledged to him afterwards that he said Mills had given to the said Patterson the parol authority to execute said bond and that he was bound by said bond, but the said Patterson further stated that at the time of said subsequent acknowledgement said bond was not exhibited to said Mills and that said Mills never delivered said bond himself.
- The judgment of the county court is then copied into the rejoinder.

Holland appeared before Tazewell Price, deputy for Sheriff Showers Price, to undertake for Street.³⁰⁹

On the petition of Sarah Sweeney, and by consent of the parties, it is ordered that the decree pronounced in this cause on the 4th day of December last, so far as the interest of the said Sweeney is concerned, be opined? & set aside and thereupon this cause again came on to be heard by consent of the parties on the papers formerly read, and the petition aforesaid of the said Sarah Sweeney, on consideration whereof, and by consent of parties, the court doth adjudge, order and decree, that John Wade, the receiver appointed to collect & distribute the proceeds arising from the sale of the slaves in the proceedings mentioned, instead of retaining one eighth part of the proceeds of said sale as the purchaser of the reversionary interest of **William Hobson, Benjamin Hobson**, of said **Sarah Sweeney’s** interest in the estate of **Matthew Hobson decd.** that he pay the said one eighth part of the proceeds of said sale after deducting therefrom the costs of suit and expenses of sale, to the said Sarah Sweeney or her legal representatives and the court doth adjudge & order that the said decree of the 4th December last in all other respects stand and be confirmed. But the said Sarah Sweeney is not to have the benefit of this decree, untill she shall have executed to the said **John Wade** bond with good security conditioned for the refunding and payment, at her death, of the amount of the sum so decreed to be paid to her.”³¹⁰

COMMENT:

The use of this record to determine the parentage of Samuel E. Mills’s wife is being developed in a separate proof argument.

[see earlier deed by which Nunley bought this land]. Acknowledged, with wife’s relinquishment, 12 November 1844 before Samuel H. Woods and Zadock Bernard, Justices of Franklin County.³¹³

On 1 January 1844, Wade and Overstreet signed a note for that amount to pay Jamima Teal “for the hire of Creed and too return him with the usual clothing.” On 26 October 1844, Jamima Teal (x) assigned the note to A. & W. W. Holland, with Terry Teal (s) as witness.³¹⁷

Drucilla had four siblings in the county when her father died. Her sister Nancy is now dead. Her brother John left for Callaway County, MO, in the 1830s.³²¹ That leaves her with only the brothers James and William.

- William Hutcherson in 1841 was an associate of the John Wade who owned a mill on Pig River.³²⁶
- William Hutcherson, Henry L. Muse, Pleasant Dickenson, John S. Brown, and Henry Frailin in December 1841 were commissioners to divide the dower slaves of Mary Ann Hobson, late widow of Benjamin Hobson.³²⁷
- William Hutcherson, Dickinson, Muse, and Wm. A. Street in July 1842 were commissioners settling the account current of Samuel Patterson, executor of Samuel Patterson, deceased.³²⁸

Debt due 23 May 1846. If debt not paid on time, then the deed takes effect. Acknowledged by Nunley in court 23 May 1845.³³¹

“Taylor agt. Boon & al. — In Chy. On the motion of the infant defendant Wm. Robertson, by **Mills Robertson** his father & legal Guardian. It is ordered that the said **Mills Robertson** be substituted and appointed Guardian ad litem to the said defendant in the place & stead of Moses G. Carper to defend his rights in this suit, and on the further motion of the said defts. Robertson by the said Mills Robertson his Guardian ad litem And for reasons appearing to the court, leave is given the said defendant to file a cross bill in the suit.”³⁴⁰

COMMENT:

This is the first reference I’ve encountered to this Mills Robertson. His FindAGrave memorial asserts that he was born 10 April 1796 in Bedford County to Jeffrey and Nancy (Dickinson) Robertson and that he is buried in Bedford’s Old Dickerson Cemetery at Moneta.³⁴¹ By bond dated 2 April 1832, he married May Taylor in Franklin County.³⁴²

Published records for Bedford County also offer two other “Mills Robertson” marriages:³⁴³

- 1821, 3, 15: Mills Robertson & Elizabeth S. Walker, dtr of “R., Sr.,” Jeffy Robertson, surety.
- 1845, 12, 22: Mills Robertson & Mary Preston, dtr of Joel, with Jesse B. Preston, surety. Married by Thomas T. Goggin.

Almost certainly, there were two generations of Mills Robertsons in Bedford; none of the above details suggest a connection to the Millses of Franklin County or to those of Albemarle > Amherst, from which Anne Mills (daughter of William and Mary) married c.1758 to Lewis Witt and settled with him in Bedford.

The Pleasant Dickinson and Samuel Patterson accounts were returned and ordered to be recorded in February term (image 465).

To secure the debt, he gives a deed of trustee (with Arthur as trustee) to “Two Feather Beds, Steads and furniture, one desk, one trunk, six chairs, one Table together with all his household and Kitchen furniture of every description, one milch Cow, all his crop of corn, Oats, Wheat & Tobacco now growing, plantation tools of every description.” Debt is due 18 June 1846. Acknowledged 18 June 1845 in court, by John Nunley.³⁴⁵

Washington Nunley (x) and wife **Rhoda** to Moses G. Carper. Nunley is indebted to John A. Also for another \$30 with interest from 28 June 1842 and \$6.93 costs, from the case of John H. Wade assignee of John Nunnalie vs. Washington Nunnalie and Asa Wright. Also further indebted to John A. Smith for \$8.36 due by note on demand. And indebted to Stephen Kesley for \$300 in annual payments of \$50 each. To secure these debts, Washington and Rhoda sign over all their “right, title, and interest in and to the Dower estate of Elizabeth Wright, Widow of the said John Wright dec’d, 3 head of cattle, one

Summons issued to Martin Tyree and **William Mills** to appear at the courthouse on 6 May next, to testify on behalf of Thomas J. Draper in his suit against Thomas J. Holland and Ebenezer Holland, tobacconists, trading under the name T J. & E. Holland. Debt from 1844 for \$500. Case began September 1845. In April 1846 Draper acknowledged receiving a debt from the Hollands as assignees of Nancy Dickinson, in a suit being heard in Henry Co. for \$67.50 due 1 January 1845 against “me & Wm. Thomason which is to be applied as an offset against a suit now pending in the current superior court of Franklin County in my name against said Hollands.” Others who were summoned to testify for Draper:

- 6 October 1846 to Daniel M. Bird
- 12 October 1846 to Martin Tyree, William B. Clay and John Patterson
- 7 April 1846 to John Patterson and William Heard
- 5 April 1847 to Thomas B. Davis, Andrew H. Turner & William S. Thomason
- 3 May 1847 to Martin Tyree and Daniel M. Bird
- 6 May 1847 to John Adams

No affidavits are found for any of the above. Jury found for Draper, with damage of \$148.19.³⁴⁸

COMMENT:

The Holland, Patterson, Tyree, and Clay connections suggest this is William Mills-Witt.

[No reference to the household goods that were mortgaged the prior year or to the accrued interest.] Nunley acknowledged the deed in court on 3 September 1846.³⁵²

COMMENT:

John Ferguson Waid's neighborhood appears to be the area in which William Mills-Witt made his first appearance on the tax roll of 1806. Waid was first cousin of Samuel McCarrell in whose employ William Mills-Witt appears to have been in 1806.

This estate partition, with plats, is not included in the loose partitions held by the Library of Virginia.³⁵⁵

Carper who sued for the benefit of Jabez Smith on a plea of debt for \$165.00 with interest from 4 April 1845 and damages of \$10. On 5 January, a summons was issued to Simonis and Holland. On 12 January "**William Mills Jr.**" and Jno. E. McCrery appeared before Fleming R. Pasley, deputy for George W. Clement, Sheriff, and undertook for Simonis and Holland. William Mills Jr. signed.³⁵⁷



COMMENT:

This Elizabeth Mills is widow of William Sr. (i.e., William of James). William Sr.’s will left occupancy rights to his land to his son “Burrel W.,” an occupancy to be shared with the widow Elizabeth. Given Elizabeth is now selling the land with “William A. B.” and wife, William A. B. should be one and the same as “Burrel W.,” the son and heir.

19 OCTOBER 1847

Marriage bond.

William Mills and Mary M. Matthews. Wm. C. Barber, surety.³⁶³

COMMENT:

This William is William B. (aka William Breckenridge), son of William and Drucilla. The William Mills who married Mary E. Abshire left the county with Mary after selling his inherited land.

The 1850 census of Franklin presents only one William and Mary. William is 30, Mary is 22. With them are John W. Mills aged 3, and James W. Mills aged 1.³⁶⁴

William C. Barber in 1857 was appointed a U.S. postmaster at Union Hall, in NE Franklin Co.³⁶⁵ The 1850 census of Franklin identifies him as a 28-year-old tailor living in the Dudley-Maddox-Hutts neighborhood—i.e., that of William Mills-Witt and his son William B.

Samuel D. Light was in 1850 a constable in adjacent Floyd County. He was also the adjacent neighbor to William and Drucilla on the 1850 Floyd census and the apparent owner of the land that William was then farming.

Note that this court order does not identify Light, suggesting that he was well known to court officials in Franklin. I have found only one connection for him in Franklin: In 1842 he married Peggy Smith of Franklin, “daughter of John.”³⁷⁷ I’ve not identified which John Smith family to which Peggy belongs.

(Emphasis added by ESM)³⁹¹

Acknowledged in clerk's office by Dillard on 7 September 1885.³⁹²

COMMENT:

The tax roll of 1886, below, reduces William Mills's acreage to 60. The remaining 66 acres seems to be the acreage referenced above as "66 acres ... near Hutts Mills." The above reference to a dividing line and an "old line" implies that a new survey had been made to separate the part taken by Wilson Cundiff and the part retained by William Mills.

The deed created by Commissioner Dillard did not previously mention any adjacent neighbor named William. **It seems likely that the "William's line" reference should have been "William Mills' line."**
