KEY FINDINGS: The tax rolls of Montgomery have significant gaps, as follows:

• 1793–96 *Missing*

1797–98

• 1799–1804 Missing

1805–1806

• 1807–1810 Missing

• 1811-1812

• 1813–1827 Missing

A correlation of extant rolls for Montgomery and Tattnall enables us to define the timeframe each taxpayer lived in each county. See table on pages 2 and 3. As a summary:

- William Cooksey, the Lotts, and the Watts were all cut out of Montgomery and into Tattnall in 1801. The Price land remained on the Montgomery side of the new border.
- Cooksey, Lott, Price, and Watts were all in the same neighborhood. Specifically
 - 1802-3-4 Cooksey is registered consecutively with Arthur Lott
 - 1805-6-7 Cooksey is separated from John and Thomas Watts by only one neighbor
 - 1808 Cooksey and John Watts are separated by only 3 neighbors
 - 1809 Cooksey and John Watts are separated by only 2 of those same 3 n'bors
 - 1810 Cooksey and John Watts have both sold their grants to Jno. B. McFarland

and left the county. (Cooksey is found 1810 in Laurens. Jno. Watts has not yet been accounted for between 1810–18, at which time he and William

Cooksey both surface in Mississippi.)

- Neither John Cooksey nor William Cooksey Jr. are taxed in Montgomery or Tattnall.
- John Price was still in Montgomery on the roll of 1806. He does not appear on the next roll, 1811. In the interim, one John Price died in Laurens leaving Montgomery land.

¹ Hall is included because (1) in 1806, Ignatius was said to have a wife *Zilphy*; and (2) his kinsman Lewis Hall and wife Nancy named a son *Alston* (William Cooksey named first son William Elston/Alston). Zilphy Hall was one of only two contemporary Zilphys identified for Montgomery and Tattnall Counties; and Ignatius Hall was appointed guardian of the second and younger Zilphy, minor daughter of John Staton in 1806 (she later married a Sellers). All lived in the same community with Cooksey, Lotts, and Watts.

Only one document mentions Ignatius Hall's wife; see Sabina J. Murray, *Tattnall County, Georgia, Loose Papers, 1801–1845*, vol. 1 (Homerville, Ga.: Huxford Genealogical Society, 2005), 27. However, genealogical accounts by offspring, online, assert that the wife of Ignatius was one *Elizabeth*, not Zilpha. The 1806 period was one in which Zilpha [Watts?] Price Cooksey was in-between known spouses.

COMMENT:

William Hall's position indicates he was among the first "H" taxpayers in the county. Records already gleaned on him suggest that he was well placed in the county, yet he owns no land—suggesting that he more likely practiced a trade or profession and is likely living with Juniper, whose unusual first name should help to track this common-name William.

The non-inclusion of John Price suggests that he is not yet 21 or else is living in a different county. The position of Cader suggests that he was one of the first taxpayers in this new county.

No PEARSON entries appear, suggesting that Cader's daughter, Elizabeth Pearson, lives in another county or else she's a widow with no land or slaves.

COMMENT:

Benijah "Bani" Boyd, to whom Letitia Cooksey's child was bound in 1811, does not appear. 7

David Boyd, who makes his first appearance on this 1798 roll, is of no known connection to Cookseys, aside from being the apparent father of Benijah. *I'm also noting him here because of his landownership in Jefferson County,* where the only known Boyds are my Jane¹, Andrew², John³ line. John's son James, in Newton County, Mississippi, married William Cooksey's putative granddaughter, Elmira Parks. My prior work on Jefferson County (including tax-roll work from 1796 to 1830) has not yielded any David Boyd. The Jefferson County Boyds were previously in the portion of Burke that was cut away to create Jefferson.

COMMENT:

The entries above reveal several things about the neighborhood and Cooksey associates:

- The Warrens settled adjacent or very close to the Lotts.
- John Doherty, the later justice who married Letitia Cooksey, lived in close proximity to the Watts.
- John Doherty, who continues to pay only a poll but is taxed on no land, is almost certainly not a farmer; presumably he is practicing a trade or profession. He should be no older than say, sixty (or at least in good health) considering that he is paying a poll.

- I am reading every page, and every column that carries names.
- Because of the complexity of the list, its poor readability, and drastic shortage of time, I'm extracting data only for Cooksey, Watts, and Price.
- Occasionally, I'm making observations that bear on issues involving Cooksey, Price, or Watts. Data categories:


• A humourous poem by [assessor?] Hardy Smith:

Here is the name of every soul That does pay tax for land or pole Who is selected as Jury men To try causes now and then.

If their Judgement appears but narrow We will serve them with a sasaurane? That is, if the money we begrudge We will take it before the Superior Judge.

• The text of the oath each taxpayer had to make when submitting his her list. [See photo, next page.) The oath states that the list is true as of **1 January of the named year.**

Note that the column generally called 'poll' is here called "male white persons above the age of 21 years." There is no maximum age stated, only a minimum. ¹⁰

Three points are clear:

- William has no sons in his household who have reached the age of 21.
- William was a taxable resident of the county at the time Nancy (Cooksey) Parks was supposedly born in Savannah.
- William, here in Tattnall as in Mississippi, is living in very close proximity to the LOTTS.

Past this point, the pages seem to be bound out of order, so that left-hand and right-hand pages seem mismatched. From the arrangement, it would be guesswork to attempt to determine the area in which each landowner lived. The matches *could* (most likely) be made if all pages were printed out and resorted according to the spacing of lines and content of entries. However, there is not enough time left in this research trip to do this.

COMMENT:

This tax roll is clearly grouping taxpayers by neighborhood. Several details are coalescing in this neighborhood, which may or may not be coincidental:

- William Cooksey reputedly named his first son William **Elston** [**Alston**?]. No Elstons have been found anywhere in any region where he has been placed to date. One James Alston lived in this region, but no connection between him and the Cooksey-Lott-Watts cluster has been found in any local records. The name *Alston* Hall continues to hold promise.
- The name Zilpha is extremely rare, but there was a contemporaneous Zilpha Hall in Tatnall, wife of Ignatius. Check Sabina Murray's abstracts.
- Evidence to date points to the Watts family as the birth family of Zilpha Price Cooksey, and the Lotts as her in-laws.
- The wife of John Watts Sr. is alleged to be a Ralls (var. Rawls, Rawl); however, DAR has not accepted this assertion. None have been found in this community.

COMMENT:

Note here the coupling of Wm. Cooksey with the Watts, suspected family of Zilpha. These two tracts are the only land credited to McFarland. As a general rule in this era, men who owned only two or three tracts (as opposed to speculators) usually purchased them in very close proximity, so the tracts could be efficiently worked by themselves or their hands.

This data also explains Cooksey's long-running suit against McFarland. Apparently, McFarland purchased the land on credit and did not pay it off according to contract.

There is no tax entry for Cooksey, who should already be in Laurens County. (No tax data appears to exist for Laurens in this period.]

Given that these are the only Boyds in the county, the likelihood is good that Bani Boyd, who was not on previous tax rolls of Montgomery with David, is a newly-adult son of David. Three perhaps coincidental issues converge here:

- David owned land in Jefferson County, where the only Boyds previously identified was the Jane-Andrew-John line that ended up in Newton County, Mississippi.
- Bani Boyd, above, is a likely father of Letitia Cooksey's son Henry.
- James Boyd, son of John, above, married Elmira Parks, putative granddaughter of William Cooksey (ergo, neice of Letitia) in Newton County.

This list is definitely post-1810 because Bani Boyd is not on the 1803–04 lists and did not marry until ca. 1811.
